Ann Rickard talks to a young local designer with global ambitions.

E'S NOT an architect, yet his home designs have won 51 awards at regional, state and national level.

He has just turned 30, yet he has designed about 150 homes in Queensland, NSW, Melbourne, Perth, Far North Queensland, Vanuatu and Bali.

Chris Clout has achieved a lot

in his 30 years. But then, he did start at the age of six, when he designed a rickety cubby house. Soon after, he upgraded to a string of "sophisticated" tree houses. At age 16, he became serious and designed his parents' home in Jervis Bay.

After an apprenticeship in carpentry and five years working with his uncle, Noosa designer Paul Clout, Chris founded his own company in 2008, Chris Clout Design.

His ground-breaking designs, featuring seamless indoor/outdoor living, resort-style pools and dramatic water features, have caught the eye of television producers in the US and he has just finished filming a program entitled Amazing Water Homes to air in America on cable channel HGTV (Home and Garden TV.)

"The show will feature three of my designs: River House, Saltwater House and Tropical House," Chris said.

"It's a very popular channel in America and they mostly feature big Hollywood and Vegas homes. The research team found me, contacted me, said they had never filmed outside America before but wanted to include me."

The US filming was followed by the filming of Sandcastles, a property program for Australian television to feature on Channel 7Two this month.

"Sandcastles is an architect-based show and when the people contacted me I told them I was not an architect but a building designer.

"They said they didn't care; they loved my work and wanted to feature it. Both the Australian and US shows will also feature Noosa so it will be good for tourism and local businesses."

The Tropical House at Noosa Waters (to feature on both programs) is one of Chris' latest and most ambitious designs.

With its street presence resembling a grand ocean liner sailing majestically through the sea, it has instant impact and looks more like a luxurious island retreat than a Noosa house. **CONTINUED ON PAGE 34**

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he wow factors are countless, and they begin at the gate (there is no door), with a man-made rainforest and pebbled rivers opening into a central courtyard, which leads to a circular pavilion area with outdoor kitchen, lounge and dining, all jutting over the infinity pool that dips into the canal.

"The house has two separate wings and wraps around the resort pool," Chris said.

"It is a design that could be plonked on any island around

the world, or on a river.

"With a triangular shaped block, I was able to give privacy (from neighbours) on either side

by creating an open courtyard garden in the middle. When you walk through the gate you are in a retreat."

The Melbourne clients gave Chris carte blanche to design a holiday home they could escape to and immediately immerse themselves in Noosa living.

"They didn't give me any restrictions on design, and they didn't change a thing," Chris

bathroom mirrors, a curved glass floor on the upper level, abundant mood lighting ... the striking features are evident in every area of the house – yet there is an air of uncluttered restraint, which allows the tropical design and outside elements to star.

The pool is a showstopper from both the house and the canal. With its central raised, circular Perspex spa and round timber platforms built into the water to house sunlounges, it is the focus from every area of the house.

It is obvious Chris has pushed all the boundaries on this project to create a jaw-dropping design that is sure to win a swag of future awards.
